## A Note from the Organizers

We are delighted to welcome you to the eleventh annual conference of the North American Victorian Studies Association. This year's theme is "Evidence," and the papers, panels, and plenaries feature a diverse array of scholarship that looks at the ways in which Victorians collected and organized evidence; at the ends to which it was put – legitimate, fraudulent, and speculative; at our own gathering and deployment of evidence in our research; and at the conceptual and epistemological implications of the word "evidence" itself.

The program features sessions devoted to science and scientific observation; archaeology, antiquarianism, and geology; the evidence provided by the human body for the workings of the mind; questions of the transcendental and the unseen; the evidence of sensory perception; and detective work and the solving of murder and other crimes. Other sessions invite one to read skeptically, to doubt evidence, to consider the values that are placed on different types of evidence, and to consider disguise and deception. There are panels devoted to individual authors, including Oscar Wilde, Thomas Hardy, Charles Dickens, and Frances Trollope; to particular genres; and to the ways in which literary and aesthetic form themselves may be said to provide forms of evidence. The overall effect of the program, as we had hoped, is to destabilize the idea of "evidence," or at the very least to show it as unreliable, often subjective in its accumulation and subject to social norms for its force and relevance. Evidence may reside within material objects, or it may be produced through deft rhetoric; claimed by one set of people, and debunked by another. It – or its interpretation – is rarely clear cut.

Special events on the program include two plenary talks featuring John Plotz and Carla Yanni, and a new tradition – a round table in which the winner of the newly established annual NAVSA book prize, Catherine Robson, will be in dialogue with the prize judges, Timothy Alborn and James Eli Adams. We have two different formats for special seminars: one that invites members to discuss pre-circulated short papers under the leadership of eminent scholars, and the other that invites discussion of works-in-progress by four leading academics from Southern California. Attendees arriving early on Wednesday will have the opportunity to participate in study sessions at the J. Paul Getty Museum and Getty Research Institute – as well as visiting the museum itself – and on Friday, there are four study sessions at the Huntington Library, Art Collections, and Botanical Gardens. Thanks to the generosity of Stephen Hindle, W. M. Keck Director of Research at the Huntington Library, conference attendees will have free access to the Collections and Gardens throughout the conference – just present your name tag!

NAVSA 2013 has been organized by a consortium of scholars from different institutions. We are particularly grateful to the support that we've received – both financial and practical – from the University of Southern California, the University of California Santa Barbara, and Loyola Marymount University, as well as the Getty. We have also benefited from the support of UCLA, and the journal *Studies in English Literature 1500-1900*, which is co-sponsoring the Banquet on Saturday night. ## Plenary I: Book Prize Roundtable

We invite you to a special session featuring the winner of the NAVSA Best Book Prize of 2012, Catherine Robson, as well as the members of the prize committee, James Eli Adams and Timothy Alborn, with moderator Melissa Gregory. The judges will share their thoughts about the significance of *Heart Beats*, and the author will be happy to answer questions about her methodology, research, and writing process. This session will be an important contribution to the conference's ongoing conversation about both new directions in the field of Victorian studies as well as the disciplinary uses of evidence.

Catherine Robson is Professor of English at New York University, where she specializes in nineteenth-century British cultural and literary studies; she is also a long-time faculty member of the Santa Cruz-based Dickens Project. Born in London, she spent her formative years in Huddersfield in the West Riding of Yorkshire; she studied for her BA at Oxford University and then proceeded to California, where she lived, on and off, for twenty years, receiving her MA and Ph. D from UC Berkeley and teaching at UC Davis from 1995 to 2010. Her first book, *Men in Wonderland: The Lost Girlhood of the Victorian Gentleman* was published in 2001 by Princeton; in 2003 she became co-editor, with Carol Christ, of *The Victorian Age* for the Norton Anthology of English Literature. For the last decade she has been working, with the support of fellowships from the NEH, the Guggenheim and Rockefeller foundations, and the Wissenschaftskolleg zu Berlin, on the memorization and recitation of poetry. Her first published piece on this topic, "Standing on the Burning Deck: Poetry, Performance, History" appeared in *PMLA* in 2005 and received NAVSA's Donald Gray prize. She is now at work on a new project, provisionally entitled "Talking to the Enemy: How Germany Captured British Voices in the Great War."

## **Plenary II: John Plotz**

"Virtually Evident: Fictional Proof"

This talk considers what kind of credence is grant to fiction, historical and otherwise, when it comes to forming a "realistic" view of the world. Rather than arguing for realist fiction's plausibility as documentary, Plotz explores the implications of the felt "virtuality" of a fictional world. Plotz asks how the "evidence" provided by fiction is distinct from, or akin to, evidence in the sciences of the day. He wishes to extend work that looks at disciplinary divides about what counts as "capturing" the ordinary nature of everyday life.

John Plotz is a Professor and Chair of English at Brandeis University. He is the author of *The Crowd* (California, 2000) and *Portable Property* (Princeton, 2008), and his current project is entitled "Semi-Detached: The Aesthetics of Partial Absorption."

## Plenary III: Carla Yanni

"Architectural Evidence: Buildings and the Construction of Knowledge"

Examining the relationship between architecture, science, medicine, and education, this talk focuses on how architecture participates in the social construction of knowledge. Yanni's lecture will include examples of different types of evidence—plans, architectural working drawings, sketches, vintage photographs, and the buildings themselves—all of which are abundant and rich with potential for interdisciplinary scholarship.

Carla Yanni is Professor of Art History at Rutgers, The State University of New Jersey. She is author of *Nature's Museums: Victorian Science and the Architecture of Display* (Johns Hopkins University, 2000) and *The Architecture of Madness: Insane Asylums in the United States* (University of Minnesota Press, 2007) and is currently writing a book on the architecture of dormitories and residence halls.
